Dear St. Charles Parishioners:

Just a note to say "Thank You" to all who donated funds, who helped us with packing the food bags and those who helped up deliver the food bags the day before Thanksgiving!

We mailed out 30 Food Lion \$50.00 Gift Cards to those who could shop themselves for their families. And we delivered 25 bags of food. Each bag contained a fresh rotisserie Chicken, cans of Cranberry Sauce, Gravy, Cut Green Beans, Spam, Corn and Peas, and boxes of Instant Mashed Potatoes and Stuffing, along with a pie and some candies.

We are now preparing to deliver bags of food or Food Lion Gift Certificates to the 55 local family households in need this Christmas. We estimate that it will cost \$50.00 per household. We plan to deliver bags of food (the day before Christmas, Tuesday December 24th) to households that have a hard time shopping themselves. We will mail those families who can shop for themselves a Food Lion \$50.00 Gift Certificate this coming week, so they have plenty of time to shop.

If you want to donate to help with the purchases, please put "Christmas Meals" in the memo of the check or write "Christmas Meals" on an envelope with cash. That will insure it goes to our Helping Hands Meals Program. If you attend Mass, you can put your donation in the collection basket. If that is not an option for you, please mail your donation to St. Charles Church, c/o Fr. J. Michael Breslin, 545 Randolph Avenue, Cape Charles, VA 23310. **Donations should be made by December 20.** The earlier you send a donation, the better able we are to know if we can reach our goal. It also gives us enough time to purchase the Food Lion Gift Certificates and still get them to the families before Christmas so they can do their own shopping.

We will pack the food bags on Sunday, December 22 at 1:00 p.m. in the Parish Hall. If you can help us, please let me or Mary Beth Briggs know. We will deliver the food bags on Tuesday, December 24, leaving from the Parish Hall at 1:00 p.m.

The 12 days of Christmas in Christian tradition – or 'Twelvetide' – signifies the time between Christmas until January 6, the Epiphany, which is the day when the three Magi arrived.

Twelfth Night is the traditional time when the Christmas tree and all the decorations are taken down.

In olden days the period was considered a time of rededication, personal renewal and worship. Gifts were also often given, especially to children as symbols of faith.

Since then, the tradition is mainly remembered in an old English (or perhaps French) carol called 'The Twelve Days of Christmas'. 'On the First Day of Christmas, my true love gave to me......'

Each gift over the twelve days is said to represents a fundamental of Christian faith.

### 1. A Partridge in a Pear Tree.

• The partridge in a pear tree represents Jesus whose birthday we celebrate on the first day of Christmas.

#### 2. Two Turtledoves

• These twin birds represent the Old and New Testaments. In this gift is the complete story of the Christian faith.

#### 3. Three French Hens

• These birds represent faith, hope, and love, but may also represent the Holy Trinity

### 4. Four Calling Birds

• These represent the four Gospels — Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

#### 5. Five Gold Rings

- The gift of the rings represents the first five books of the Old Testament, known as the Torah or Pentateuch.
  - Genesis
  - Exodus
  - Leviticus
  - Numbers
  - Deuteronomy

### 6. Six Geese a-Laying

- These can be traced back to the first story found in the Bible, which is the creation of the world. Each egg represents the six days of creation.
  - God created the heavens and the earth
  - God created the sky and seas
  - God created the land and plants
  - God created the sun, moon, and stars
  - God created fish and birds
  - God created land animals and man

### 7. Seven Swans a-Swimming

- The swans represent the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit
  - Prophecy
  - Ministry
  - Teaching
  - Exhortation
  - Giving
  - Leading
  - Compassion
- 8. **Eight Maids-a-Milking:** The Eight Maids represent the 8 Beatitudes.
  - Blessed are...
    - the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
    - Those who mourn: for they shall be comforted.
    - The meek: for they shall inherit the earth.
    - Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness: for they shall be filled.
    - The merciful: for they shall obtain mercy.
    - The pure in heart: for they shall see God.
    - The peacemakers: for they shall be called children of God.
    - They which are persecuted for righteousness sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

### 9. Nine Ladies Dancing

- These nine dancers were really the gifts known as the fruit of the Spirit
  - Love
  - Joy
  - Peace
  - Patience
  - Kindness
  - Goodness
  - Faithfulness
  - Gentleness
  - Self-control
- 10. Ten Lords a-leaping
  - This represents the Ten Commandments
- 11. Eleven Pipers Piping
  - Most people think of the 12 disciples but after Judas betrayed Jesus and left, only eleven disciples remained, and therefore, the Eleven Pipers Piping signify the 11 Faithful
- 12. Twelve Drummers Drumming
  - The final gift is tied directly to the Catholic Church. The drummers are the 12 points of doctrine in the Apostles' Creed

# **Good News!**

December 22, 2024 Fourth Sunday of Advent (C) Micah 5:1-4a / Hebrews 10:5-10 / Luke 1:39-45

Most of the time we find ourselves backing our way into the will of God, or maybe even feeling our way into it. There are times when the will of God is quite clear: Should I lie or tell the truth? Should I steal or not? Most often, however, the will of God is not so clear. Too often it becomes a question of how to negotiate an aspect of life that's been handed to us, often a reality we cannot escape. It may be an unwanted divorce, or a son or daughter in a questionable relationship, or an illness that dismantles one's life plans. On the one hand, it is not as if God hands out scripts that we are expected to live by. On the other hand, God is part of all that unfolds. Somewhere in the midst of that is the will of God, which is another way of saying somehow you and I need to negotiate what we never chose, but is now served up by life. Or is it served up by God? Or by our own doing? Or all of that? That's what I mean when I say we

It is what Jesus sorted out in the desert when he was tempted, "I come to do your will, O God." It is Elizabeth's story of an unexpected pregnancy in her old age. It is Mary saying "Yes" to an uncharted path. Living God's will seems mostly to be a sorting process.

Where does the Hail Mary prayer come from?

The Hail Mary owes its origin to the rosary. The traditional story of the rosary was that Mary herself appeared to St. Dominic in the twelfth century and gave him the rosary with the promise that if he spread devotion to the rosary, his religious order would flourish. In the twelfth century, religious orders recited together the 150 psalms as a way to mark the hours of the day and the days of the week. In order to pray the psalms, though, people had to know how to read. People who didn't know how to read wanted to share in the practice, so the rosary, or praying on beads, began as a parallel prayer practice. It was a way that illiterate people could remember the Lord and his Mother throughout the day.

The first rosaries consisted of a string of 150 beads, and, much as we do now, a person would pass over each bead after saying a prayer, usually the Our Father. Later, people added the Archangel Gabriel's greeting—"Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee"—and later still, Elizabeth's prayer we hear in today's Gospel—"Blessed art thou among women." Finally this prayer was added in the sixteenth century: "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death."
